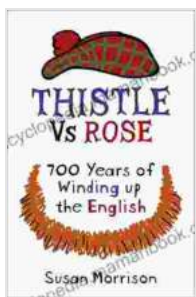

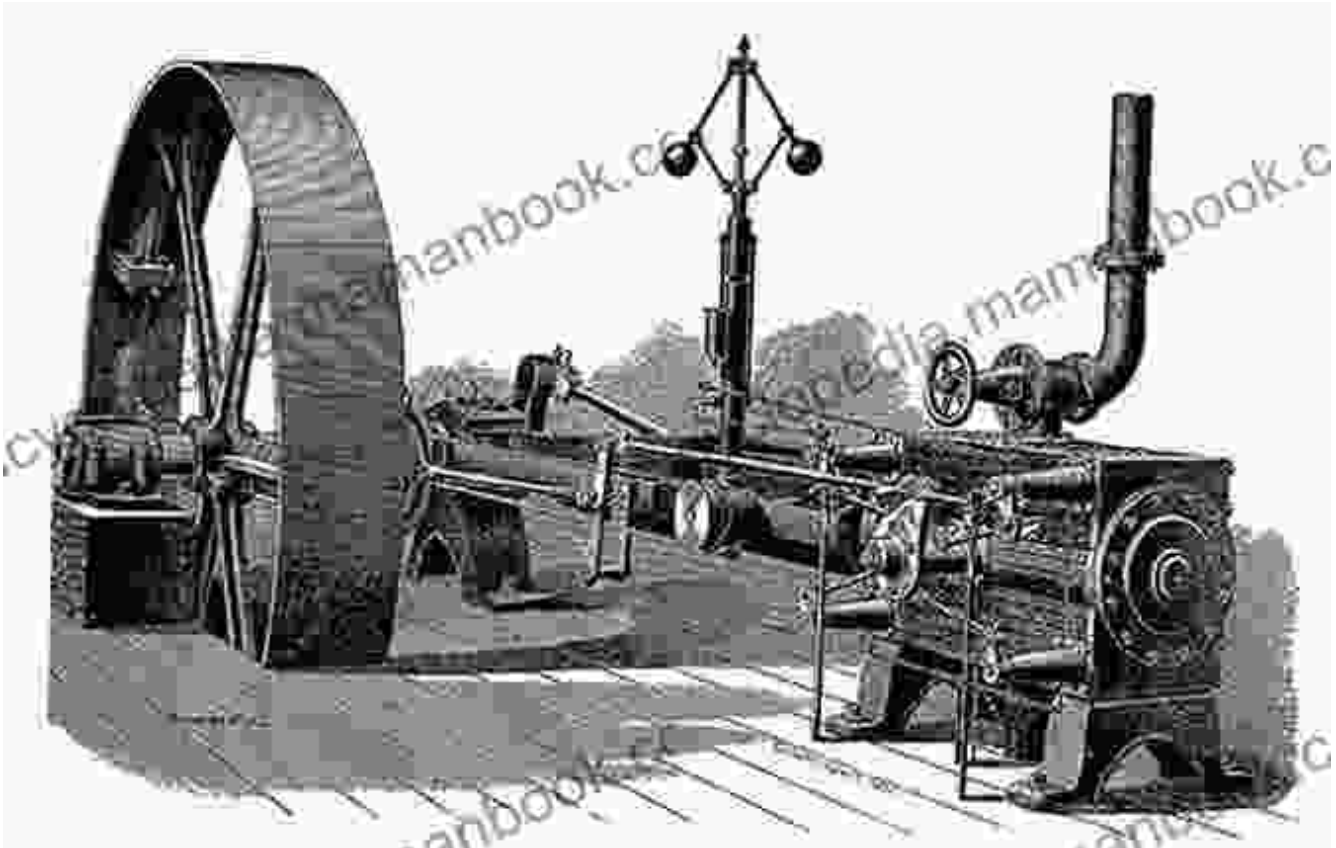
The English Civil War (1642-1651)

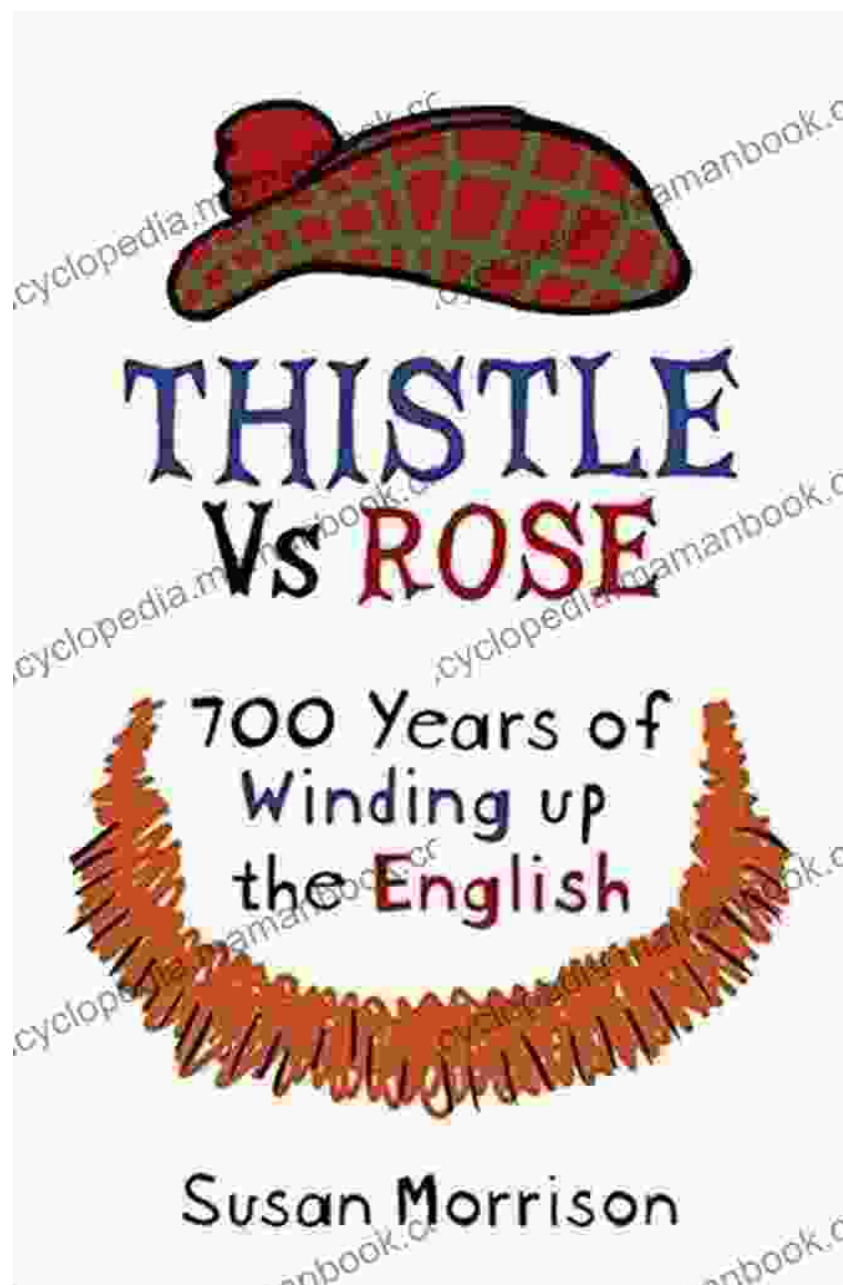

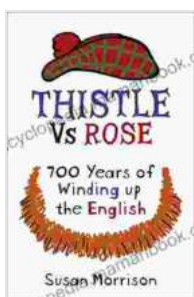
